



Airbnb enters luxury travel market

The online accommodation booking company Airbnb is going upmarket. It is moving into the luxury travel market. CEO Brian Chesky has announced an improvement in the company's business model. It wants richer people to use it. The company will offer new types of places to stay such as vacation homes and boutique hotels. The company has over four million rooms on its site in 81,000 cities and 191 countries. It has helped make over 260 million reservations since it launched nine years ago. Mr Chesky hopes to increase this to more than one billion people staying in its rentals by 2028. Chesky said: "Airbnb is still an alternative. It's still not for everyone. Today we will show you our road map: Airbnb for everyone." Airbnb does not own any real estate, or properties. It acts as a broker between property owners who want to make extra cash by renting out their rooms or homes, and travelers looking for a cheaper, more homely alternative to hotels. The company makes money from the booking fees it charges. Its vision is to branch out into luxury accommodation, restaurant reservations, and adventure travel experiences. A new option will allow people to book "unique spaces". This includes things like yurts - the large, circular tents that are home to many people in Mongolia. Airbnb's new "Beyond" option will offer travelers "full-on luxury stays" that include "some of the world's nicest homes".

Comparative and **Superlative** (Adjectives and Adverbs)

to compare one person or thing with another person or thing.

We can repeat comparatives with *and* to say how something changes.

Ex. Train journeys in the UK are becoming more and more expensive.

We can use two different comparatives with *the* to say how something changes as something else changes. Ex. The taller she grew, the thinner she became.

to compare one person or thing with several other people or things of the same kind.

We often use superlatives with the *present perfect* to talk about a particular life experience.

Ex.

That was **the funniest** film I've seen this year.

He swam **the fastest** he has ever swum to win gold.

• We usually use **than** with the comparative, but not always.

Ex. Can you talk more quietly, please - I'm trying to work.

• We usually use **the** before the superlative, but we sometimes use a possessive adjective.

Ex. December is our busiest time of year.

• Remember: Some adjectives and adverbs have irregular comparative and superlative forms.

a property has no frills and only offers basic accommodations. A one-star rating doesn't necessarily mean a hotel is dirty, unkept or in a bad location. It simply means you'll have a place to sleep, and that's pretty much it.



Like one-star hotels, two-star properties are typically more affordable than hotels that have a higher rating — they are also usually quite comfortable.



Three-star hotels ordinarily have some unique amenities and provide quality service.



Four-star hotels are often noted for their upscale quality and extraordinary comfort.



A five-star property provides flawless guest services in a state-of-the-art facility such as premium dining options and personalized services to its guests. With no detail being overlooked, these hotels commonly even provides high-end, luxury toiletries for guests.
