

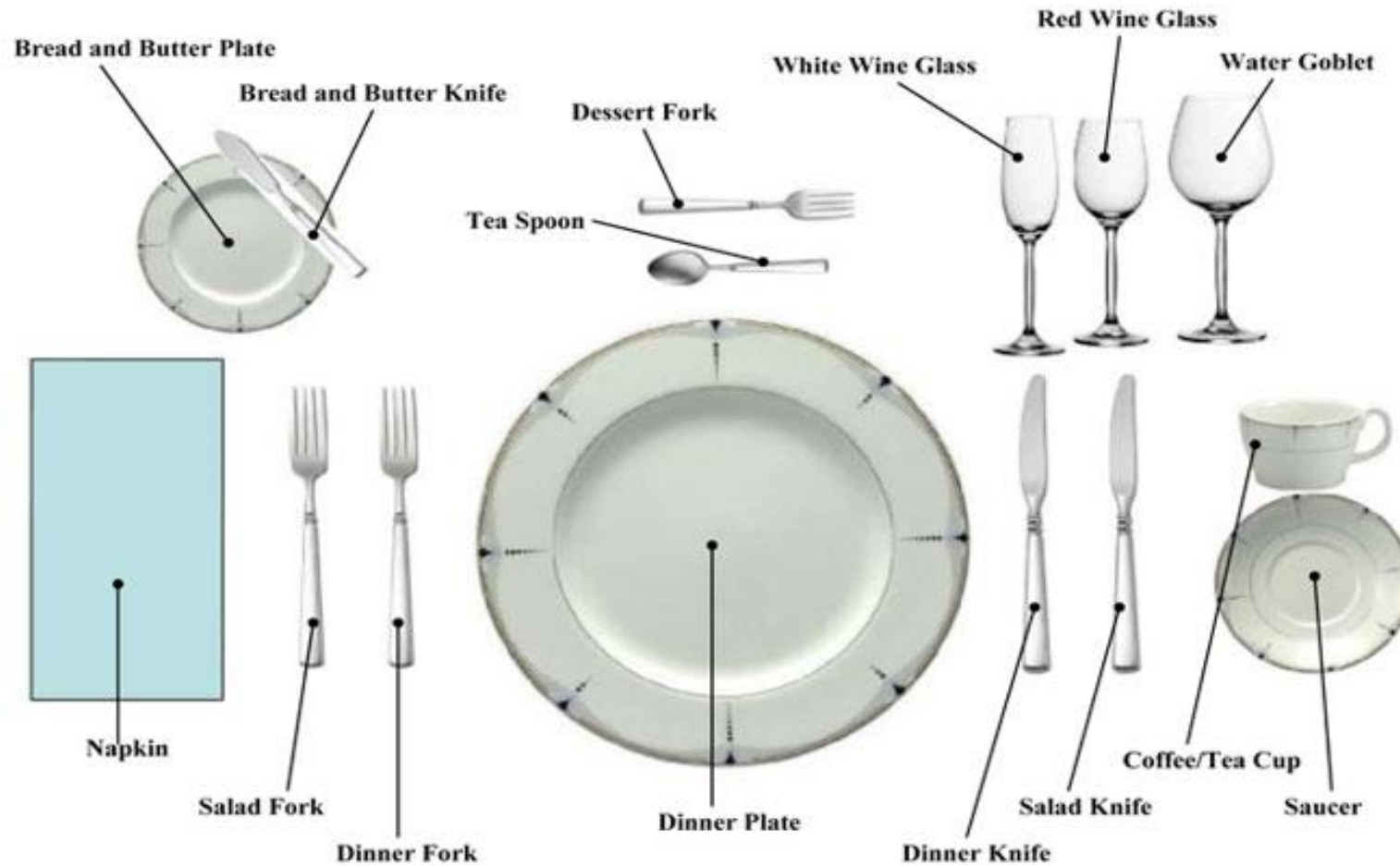

Many modifies only countable nouns.

"Many Americans travel to Europe."

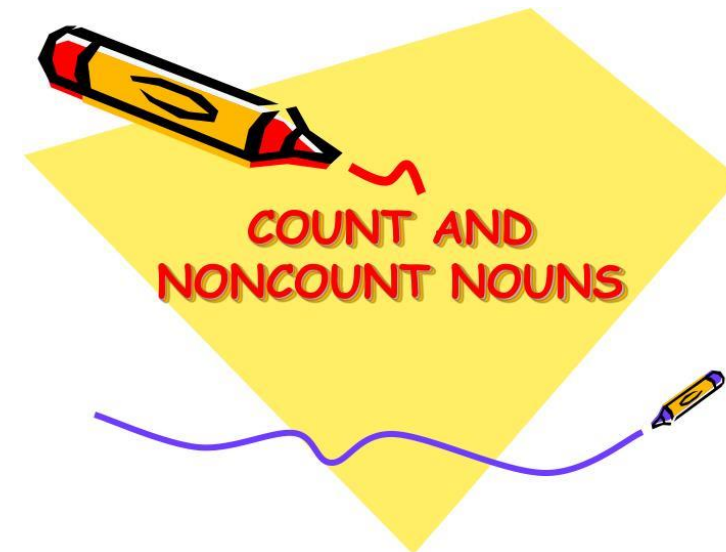
Little/Few:

Little modifies only uncountable nouns.

Few modifies only countable nouns.
